

I need you to survive.

We are, if nothing else, ambitious. This past year was about delivering on the promise of show not tell. From SONG members, to staff, to board, we spent 2015 responding, as we do every year, to the violence that shapes nearly every aspect of our lives. But together, we refused to be subsumed by the great challenges of our time, and we refused to forget the SONG vision of building a region, a world, free from fear. There are always haters: both those who are gunning for us, and those who are standing as obstacles for fear of getting left behind. They, and sometimes even we, question what the charge of free from fear means. How do we get there? What is the best way? Are we the ones? Is it even possible? And though the questions are often larger than the answers, we come back over and over again to say to each other, "I need you to survive."

Our survival as LGBTQ people, as Black people, as immigrants, as poor and working people has never been guaranteed. Despite that, generations of our people have ensured that we would be here. In this moment, today, we owe our legacy and our leadership to the trials, errors, lessons, and victories of millions of abolitionists, enslaved peoples, campesinos, activists, organizers, revolutionaries, Adelitas, border crossers, chingonas, occupation resisters, brujas, pastors, root doctors and midwives over the passage of time fighting to get free.

In 2016, we call you to join us in renewing and recommitting to the sacred covenant of our ancestors and of our lives.

This is a twenty-first century Queer Kin Creed. This is our pinky promise to each other to continue to build SONG as an organization that is hopeful, brave, agile, and rooted in a willingness to experiment and make mistakes in the name of liberation. This is our sacred covenant to each other, because we need us to survive. Our lives are what are at stake.
